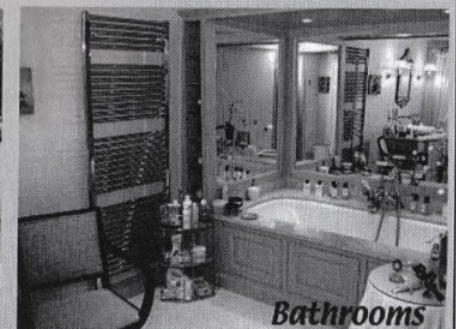

An excellent offering for everybody: musical delights of every genre; art to inspire; art to create; family fun, with a marathon chicken, a Calendar Girl entrant in the duck race, and the Rector walking on custard. It was uplifting to experience all this as part of the Abbey and community vision for hospitality and outreach through the arts. Woven through this was the spiritual life of the Abbey, with special worship, poetry, biblical portraits, and community art. The Dorchester Festival gave us in the village and many hundreds of visitors an amazing programme over ten days. It was a profound moment, standing on the river bank where perhaps King Cynegils was baptized by St Birinus, where monks had served and people have prayed, and where, centuries later, the community still comes together to love and serve God, one another, and our world.

Standing under the poplars, we read a poem by Mary Oliver:
When I am among Trees.

*Around me the trees stir in their leaves
and call out, "Stay awhile."
The light flows from their branches.
And they call again, "It's simple," they say,
"and you too have come into the world to do this,
to go easy, to be filled with light, and to shine."*

So with the glorious activity of the Festival over for this year, we remain in this beautiful place, with the Abbey at its heart, with people of kindness around us, and a precious natural environment to treasure. Jesus said that he came that we might have life and have it in all its fullness (John 10.10). This abundant life, this gift from God, fills us with light that we can also reflect out into the world. There is so much for which to give thanks.

Recycling Update

We are disappointed to report that South Oxfordshire dropped to third place amongst English Council areas for our recycling rate for the year 2024/2025 having been top for the previous 2 years. Let's try and get back to the top during this current year which has just started. Better still would be to reduce the amount of waste we generate. The County Council has to pay a gate fee of so much per tonne to have our residual waste burned to generate electricity. That fee is quite high so reducing our residual waste would help ease the financial burden on OCC.

Since the booking system for the recycling centres was introduced there have been concerns this might increase flytipping. According to the latest figures that has not been the case but it is early days so please be alert and report any fly tips you see to Biffa please. SODC has carried out a number of successful prosecutions on offenders.

BinDays App

We are pleased to confirm the launch of BinDays, our new web app for residents to find out when their bins will be emptied for their next two scheduled waste and recycling collections. BinDays replaces Binzone which we are no longer able to support due to updated internet security standards. Live Streaming

Live streaming is being introduced for full council meetings, which will appear (via Microsoft Teams) on the council's Committee Meetings YouTube channel Both South and Vale already livestream a wide range of meetings although we are unable to stream full Council meetings due to space and technical limitations

Renters Rights Act

The Renters' Rights Act started coming into effect on 1 st May. SODC will have a statutory duty to enforce the new legislation, and we are anticipating an increase in demand for housing needs services. The council worked hard to prepare for the changes and the impact it will have on housing services.

District Councillor Report

Haseley Trading Estate

I had the opportunity to visit Haseley Trading Estate in April, to look at the site works so far. The schedule is running behind due to nesting birds and bats, but an arrangement has been made with Culham and the Haseley site is likely to be operational in early 2027. The much-awaited traffic plan is in discussion but may not be ready for consideration quite as early as previously hoped.

Understanding that drainage was one of the main concerns, I asked lots of questions and was advised that the drainage and attenuation methods are expected to result in less surface water reaching the culvert than when the previous business was operating the site.

In terms of screening, the planting will now be deeper which will have a positive impact from a visibility perspective.

Beard are delivering Social Value as part of the contract, with areas including, CO2 offsetting, work experience, homeless back to work events, women in construction, and use of local supply chains within a 30 mile radius of the site where possible. They are also keen to work with the surrounding primary schools to promote construction safety, and also a marvellous machines event.

Litter Clearing

The Council and its waste collection and street cleaning contractor, Biffa, use the Defra 'Code of Practice' to assess the type of cleaning required. Biffa is therefore employed to carry out the following tasks:

- Adopted highway, pavement and path mechanical sweeping
- Litter picking
- Litter and dog waste bin emptying. There is no set timetable for bin emptying but if a bin is reported to the contractor as full, it must be emptied within a set timescale depending on the location of the bin
- Deep cleaning including leaf fall
- Fly tip removal
- Graffiti and fly posting removal from District Council property
- Dead animal removal

Rural areas are cleaned when it is needed. So if you think a particular location is in need of some attention, email Biffa at admin.southoxford@biffa.co.uk or call them on 01235 422123.

Insect Week: Tiny Creatures, Big Impact

They may be small, but insects make a BIG difference to nature recovery. From **22 June to 28 June**, the Royal Entomological Society's spotlight week is a celebration of all things insect.

And these small critters really do make all the difference... there are more than 24,000 species in the UK alone, and they can be found in almost every habitat. Their jack-of-all-trades role spans pollinators, predators, pests, parasites and prey, and the study of insects has long been central to conservation, food production, medicine, and ecology.

At Wild Oxfordshire, insects are essential to our Yellow Wagtail Partnership project. Established in 2020 by patron Dr Robin Buxton, the Partnership works with the Earth Trust Church Farm Partnership and Lower Farm, to "learn and communicate as much as possible about the impact of different land management techniques both on this species and the wider environment".

Then at the Foundry corner our own council is doing massive works just to house a few lorries - I realise that is a rather sweeping statement. The massive works at the Haseley corner, some of us can remember what used to be there, the A329, then a B road, that wound its way round the front of the site, which was then an iron Foundry, mainly producing haymaking machinery, I can remember going here with my father to pick up hay-sweep tines. I of all people understand that time moves on but what does worry me is the inevitable destruction of what is in the way of progress, and the scrapping of perfectly good materials. I in my time have progressed, including moving our site, but have wherever possible reused materials and rebuilt the buildings. It appears that there are perfectly good buildings just being torn down and, I suspect, thrown away. Not that long ago I would have given my eye teeth for some of those materials. I am not complaining just making a statement about the way we are using our planets resources just to progress.

In West Oxfordshire it seems there is widespread criticism over a planning application for a large poultry development, on the grounds that we should not be allowing such development, pollution, animal cruelty and so on. My comments are that, although many people's perception is chicken production crosses the line of animal cruelty, we have to ask ourselves when buying a chicken or eggs, do we look for the cheapest? The retailer will always try and sell what the customers wants and sets the price accordingly, this inevitably will drive down the producer price, which in turn encourages the cheaper production methods that some of us criticise. If only the general public were prepared to pay a realistic price for food, we could then criticise production methods. Interesting to note that no mention was made of agriculture or food, or it's security, in the Kings speech, probably the most important issues, in the present climate.

By the time this goes to press and local doorsteps, we will have had yet another Bank holiday, the third in seven weeks, now none till the end of August. Whilst I am not against a Bank holiday why was May chosen for an extra holiday, why could it not have been July day, or similar, only a Labour government could have thought of anything so ridiculous. The present Government seems more interested in themselves than ruling a country that needs a clear direction to the future. We need a good shake up!

View from Views

Since I last wrote somehow everything looks, and feels, different with the autumn sown Barley now well into ear and looking promising; the wheat seems to be getting over the horrendous winter; our spring sown crops also seem to, at last, look good, except that is for our Poppies that seem to be struggling due to the dry conditions - it looks as if some will have to be replanted. I get the impression that the crops growing on land not ploughed are in better condition than those on ploughed land, it remains to be seen if this is a fact when harvested. My records show that the rainfall this spring is not dissimilar to March/April last year, 23mm this year and 30mm last, it looks as if this has had some effect on the crops.

It is great to wake to the sounds of the dawn chorus, although by 15th May it is usually over by wakeup time. The Lapwings I mentioned last month are still with us - whether they have fledged or been predated, I guess we will never know; they would be extremely vulnerable being in an open and bare field, with easy sighting, and access, to Kites, Buzzards, Foxes, and Badgers, to name but a few. The question of predation is a vexed one, having just mentioned above Kites, these were, as we all know, reintroduced successfully recently, and now we are threatened with the introduction of White Tailed Eagles on Exmoor. I say vexed because although I am a supporter of conservation, these predators do have an effect on our existing wildlife, one of the reasons for the decline of the Hare population being a possible example. On another nesting issue we have 2 nesting boxes one new and one old both seemed to be bereft of activity until recently, perhaps they wait till they know we are not watching before they go in and out. On this new nesting box I have very thoughtfully added a little perch thinking they would like that but it, has allowed Magpies and wood peckers a perch as well, as the wood around the pop hole has been chipped away, I guess to give the predators access, not a good idea and I guess why it was not made with one. Have so far heard a distant Cuckoo, Swallows, but not sure of the Swifts as yet. It is also evident in the hedgerows that the Ermine moth is around.

Those of us that live around here are well aware of the 2 development sites in our area, the Foundry/Haseley corner and "Le Manoir aux Quat'Saisons", I am sure in the case of the Manor the planning consent did not include the removal of mature trees and such extensive earthworks. I guess when you are a big company like Belmond or, whoever owns them now, you can flout the rules and get away with it.

JUNE IN THE GARDEN & ALLOTMENT

June is the first of the Summer months, including the longest day of the year June 21st. It's the peak growing season. Watering new plants and feeding crops. Deadhead faded blooms and hoe the borders to keep weeds at bay.

IN THE GARDEN

Hellebores: Will need tidying, give them a spring clean, remove faded flower stems, cutting away old blotchy or diseased leaves to encourage new healthy foliage for next season.

Lilacs Syringa: Lilacs should be pruned immediately after they have flowered. Be careful not to cut off the new green shoots. Lilacs bloom on "old wood" (growth from the previous year).

Roses: June is the peak season for Roses. Lots of blooms, colour and fragrance in the garden. To keep the rose bushes, climbers look amazing and keep them thriving, deadhead regularly once the flowers are going over, cut them off and water well by applying liquid feed. I do recommend Q4 feed.

Dahlias: Will now be showing new leaves if you have planted them if not it's not too late. Dahlias need deep, consistent watering and a thick layer of mulch to lock in moisture. Once the plants are 30-40cm tall, pinch out the tip. This will encourage bushy growth and far more blooms for cut flowers.

Hanging Baskets & Planters: Watering daily early morning and evening so that they don't dry out direct the water into the compost so as not to scorch the plants, deadhead regularly. Pinch off spent flowers this stops the plants going to seed and will produce more blooms and flower longer.

IN THE ALLOTMENT

Hopefully you will start to see the rewards of early sowing and carrots, beetroot, lettuce etc can be harvested.

Runner beans: Plant these now they will need watering well.

Courgettes: Plant these, water these well and make a little dip so that the water sits in the dip then you will get good size courgettes.

Tomatoes: Pinch out the side shoots that grow diagonally in the "armpit" between the main stalk and the leaf branch. This will produce better quality fruit rather than extra leaves. Again water well and tie in new growth regularly.

Green houses: Make sure these are well ventilated on warm days. Floors and staging can be dampened down, this lessens the chance of red spider mite, which thrives in hot dry conditions.
